


# Saint of the Week St. John of the Cross

Already as a child, St. John of the Cross learned how to love through self-sacrifice from his parents. Born in Spain in 1542, his father renounced wealth and status to marry a weaver's daughter. Destitute after his father's death, his family wandered homeless in search of work. At 14 St. John worked in a hospital caring for those with incurable diseases and diseases of the mind. He became a Carmelite friar and friend of Saint Teresa of Avila, who encouraged him to work for

the reform of the order, which he did despite great suffering. Threatened by the reform, his own confreres kidnapped him and locked him in a small cell, beating him regularly. After his escape he devoted his life to sharing his mystical experience of faith leading to God's Love even through the darkest night of the soul.

A most remarkable poet and mystic, he died in Andalusia in 1591.

# What Have I Lived Today

As I look back on the day, I ask myself "What have I lived today?"

It's the question.

St. John of the Cross once wrote:

At the end of our lives we'll be judged on love.

There's no shortage of ways to love! And when my imagination needs prompting, there's the seven corporal works of mercy for starters:

- Feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked,
- Shelter the homeless, visit the sick, visit the imprisoned, bury the dead.

The seven spiritual works of mercy remind me that love is not only about doing "external" activities. Love is to:

- Counsel the doubtful, instruct the ignorant, admonish sinners;
- Comfort the afflicted, forgive offenses;
- Bear wrongs patiently, pray for the living and the dead.

But the question always comes back to the basic one: How much love have I put in to the day?

Love in all its colours -

- Humour when tensions arise over small issues,
- Generously sharing gifts received,
- Attending to doing little things well,
- Approaching others with a smile
- Speaking, serving, doing, waiting

All out of love.

My great chance is to "live" life, not simply to let it slide by.
